

Sports results were also pleasing. Newman managed to win both the A.C.C. Swimming and Athletic Carnivals.


Socials proved to be popular with both Years 8 and 9. Bushbands provided the music and an enjoyable evening was had by all.

International Year of Peace was the theme.


A symbolic banner was designed and made by Mrs Fordham and Newman Siena Art Students.






Cultural For the participate that go on Festival



Jennifer tells how

Jennifer Kennedy (14), of Wembley Downs, believes Australia could do a lot more to solve the problems of poverty and hunger in the Third World.

On Sunday Jennifer left for Canberra where she will meet the Governor General, Sir Ninian Stephens, and overseas aid officials.

Jennifer is one of 25 Australian high school students who were given an all expenses-paid trip to Canberra after winning an Australian Airline Study Tour Scholarship.

Submit

To win the scholarships, which were run in conjunction with the World Vision 40-hour famine, the students had to submit an essay, poem, song or piece of artwork about need in the developing world.

Jennifer submitted an essay about poverty in the Solomon Islands.

She said she decided to write about the Solomon Islands after spending a five-week holiday there last Christmas.

"I was there with my Mum and my brother," Jennifer said.

"We stayed in a lot of small villages. I just couldn't believe how poor some of those people were."

Jennifer said Australia could do more to help developing countries if it offered expertise along with financial aid.

She said the people needed to be shown how they could become more self-sufficient.

Offering money without any other sort of technical assistance only made the developing country dependent on the Western world.

Jennifer said people who said that Australia couldn't afford to offer financial aid to Third World countries, were simply being selfish.

"I don't think it's fair to say that charity should begin at home and we shouldn't try to help people in the Third World," Jennifer said.

'GOLD FEVER'

The discovery of gold in Australia was very important and it changed the life of all those involved, without this Australia would not be the nation it is today

It began in 1851 with the discovery of gold in New South Wales near Bathurst, by Edward Hargreaves. Although it had been discovered before this time, it was not publicly announced because of the convicts.

This find resulted in rushes to New South Wales and many new towns spran This find resulted in rushes to New South Wales and many new towns sprang up. The Victorian Government was disturbed by this as they lost most of their population, so they offered a reward for the discovery of gold in Victoria. It wasn't long before gold was discovered and as it was a rich find and near Melbourne many thousands of people flocked to Victoria to try for a bit of quick money, as well as people from everywhere around Australia, people came from other countries around the world - mainly Britain and China. The Chinese were not very popular because they worked so hard and had different customs and many riots broke out.

The goldrushes also resulted in a decrease of labourers in other jobs. Many squatters lost their labourers and as they were in government they tried to make life as difficult as they could for the miners and introduced licences which had to be paid whether you found gold or not. Another job to lose workers was the Police force. 40/50 police left for the goldfields and the Victorian Government had to put up with volunteers which were mainly ex-convicts from Tasmania and were a very rough lot.

The conditions on the goldfields were not much better. There was terrible overcrowding, very little water and many diseases going around. There was very little food as the miners did not produce it themselves and it had to be carted from other towns which made it very expensive. Most of the miners lived on a diet of tea, mutton, damper and a lot of alcohol, this resulted in many crimes. Other problems were the heat, the flies, mosquitoes and the snakes and also the fact that many families broke up because they were separated for so long. The miners lived in tents or poorly made shanties built of bark and wood. After a hard day's work the miners relaxed by drinking and gambling or singing songs.

At the beginning of the goldrushes the gold was all on the surface and was very easy to obtain either by dryblowing or by panning, but after all this was taken only the deep reefs of gold could be mined and this took a lot of time and money. It was then that the gold licences were questioned.

Things came to a head in 1854 when a miner was murdered at Eureka Hotel. The owner an ex-convict named Bentley was arrested but acquitted in trial. The miners all believed he was guilty so they burnt down the hotel and a few were arrested. After this the miners held a meeting at which they burnt their licences and under the direction of Peter Lalor built a stockade and formed their own colony. This was short lived though because a few days later the police invaded and destroyed the stockade killing and injuring many miners.

Although this was a failure, it resulted in the abolition of licences and the right for anyone to vote and stand in Parliament.

The happenings on the goldfields led to great mateship among Australians, and made Australia the great country it is today.

"GOLD FEVER"

The discovery of gold brought many changes to Australian society. Most people wanted to 'strike it rich' and left their jobs to look for gold. Conditions on the diggings were harsh, and many miners complained of the licences, which later led to trouble.

In 1851, the discovery of gold at Bathurst by Edward Hargreaves was made public. People reacted in different ways. Many were afraid their employees would leave and the majority of people, left for the goldfields. Within four months, there were over 1,000 miners on the goldfields, and new towns popped up. Because many Victorians were moving to N.S.W., the Victorian Government set up a reward for the first person to find gold in Victoria. Soon Victoria was flooded with people from overseas, and other Australian colonies, coming to look for gold.

At first, all gold found belonged to the Crown, however the Government was worried about the economy and a mining licence was introduced at one pound, ten shillings a month. The cost was high, but still people came, on horse and cart, on foot, and some brought camels.

Conditions on the goldfields were hard and quite disturbing. Most miners lived in tents, as these were temporary shelters, and they did not have time to build suitable housing. In summer there was a shortage of water, and disease and insects were common. Low fever, dysentry and epidemics affected the health of the crowd, and there were no doctors among the miners.

Prices on the goldfields were always high, as there was a shortage of goods. Most miners lived on damper, mutton, tea and alcohol, which was obtained from 'sly grog' shops. After a day's work the miners would sing songs, but many gambled and the drunken got into brawls. The thieves were a problem also, as they tried to trick the miners.

The gold on the goldfields was found in two forms, in the alluvial deposits, and in the matrix. Surface gold was rare, and the underground gold, took a lot of work to obtain. Other miners used a simpler method of extracting gold. This was called panning. If a digger did discover gold he had to process his find. The gold was cleaned and dried, and then weighed, and the result known.


Life was hard for many miners, as they were separated from their families and friends. To pass the time, many would watch the various actors and musicians perform. Theatre and dance were also regular features on the goldfields. Many miners who needed money, became vendors, as goods were always in great demand.

The gold rush resulted in labour shortages, for many of the other industries. Employers were forced to offer high wages, to keep the workers in the cities. The gold found was traded all over the world and the wealthier people spent their money freely, which helped business to grow.

Another important result was the rapid rise in population. People from overseas came to search for gold in Australia. Many of these were Chinese which was a problem as the miners resented them. The gold discovered, also helped the pastoral industry as more food was needed. Communications grew slowly, and railways were built.

The goldrush, made some people happy, and others miserable. It had a great effect on society, and without the goldrush, many important changes would not some made fortunes.

Katie Winterbourne have taken place. Though life was hard, the miners managed to survive, and The increase in trade and population, helped Australia to become a more recognised country, which helped it grow. Linda Radici


Father Anscar is working with Aboriginal people.

The day was over all too quickly, but as Father Nick reminded us as he gave us all a blessing, we had to





would regularly steal the ball off larger and stronger opponents. Cassandra looks to have a great




