

### Salhy, David, Gemma and James...their Report



This year was the first and only year to see the Year 8 and 9 students recieve a camp. Both years experienced the Point Peron and Stoneville Campsites with enjoyment.



As I walk into the allocated area for buyers, I see a battle going on between two students, they shove and push and it is all for a place in line.


