Principal's Report



Today as I prepare to write for the College Year Book of 1991 and, in particular on behalf of and concerning Newman Siena, I reflect on the special character of the College as I have known it for over twenty years. Essentially it is a place of beginnings.

It is in the nature of beginnings that they are characterised, on the one hand, by a degree of uncertainty and, on the other, by enormous hope, optimism and the willingness to go forward in faith. The story of Newman Siena is marked by these qualities.

What is now Newman Siena began as "Siena", Dominican Girls' High School for Years 8-12. I have been part of the change from that five year High School to a three year High School for girls to the school as it is today, a co-educational one for Year 8 and 9 students and a component of Newman College. I have experienced the growth and change that have taken place in staffing, enrolments, the structure of the building, the internal management and the educational system itself.

It has been rightly said that where there is change, there is life. Growth and change have been very much part of the life of Newman Siena. Underpinning that change, of course, are the constants, the values we have always sought to retain the same spirit of service that prompted the Sisters initially to build the school, the pastoral care and concern exercised, the encouragement to seek after Truth and to pursue excellence.

My years at the College have been busy but happy ones. I leave with treasured memories of parents who have made great sacrifices to keep their children at school because they saw the contribution of Newman Siena to their son's or daughter's total development as more important than the personal acquisition of material things, who have wholeheartedly supported our efforts and who have worked with us to obtain the best in every way for their children; memories, too, of teachers and other staff dedicated to their vocation of educating and caring for the students and for whom the amount of time spent was never a consideration. I have experienced the sensitivity and kindness of students, seen them grow in maturity and faith, enjoyed their humour, appreciated their courage in times of difficulty, their generosity, initiative and independence.

As I leave the school scene behind me, I take this final opportunity to thank those students, parents and staff who have been part of my journey through all these changing years. My hope for each one of you and for all who, in the future, will be part of Newman Siena, is that God will continue to bless you in a special way all the days of your lives.

Finally, in the words of our Newman school prayer, may we all "Grow in wisdom and love and act with courage to choose what is right, as we move

Throughout 1991 individual students from Room 4 have attempted and achieved a variety of personal objectives through an educational programme specifically tailored to their needs for

a successful transition from a school environment to an "independent living - work" environment. Specific components of the educational programme are development of literacy and numeracy skills, involvement in various recreational activities, extensive involvement in community service projects, preparing for further education, acquisition of special skills such as First Aid through St John Ambulance and an off campus social development course. Additionally all students take part in a continuous programme of work experience to develop their awareness and skills required in the work force and hopefully to enhance their chances of employment after leaving school.

At different times several of the Room 4 students have experienced work and community service at one or more of the following places: City of Stirling, Karrinyup Library, St Vincent de Paul, Cottage Homes, Qantas Catering Service, Kott

Gunning Barristers and Solicitors, Osborne Park Hospital, Foodlands at Woodlands, Topp-Nott Hairdressers, Catherine McAuley Daycare Centre, Woodlands Childcare, Moolanda Childcare, Meals on Wheels, Lloyds Smash Repairs, Homes for the Aged, W.A. Salvage, Coles Fossey, Hire All and Sale, Emmanuel Centre, Timewest, Miss Maudes, CCA Snack Foods and Nappy service.

When not involved in work off campus, Room 4 students have spent some time developing their entrepreneurial skills at the school through the operation of a lolly packaging business that supplies orders to the Jaycees. The students are paid a nominal wage for their effort.

Finally, mention ought to be made of the fact that several Room 4 students have at different times achieved awards, recognition or prizes through successful participation in sport, in a competition sponsored by Stirling City Council and through a display of their artistic talent at the 1991 Osborne Park Show. Most of the students won prizes for their craft and cooking items that were entered in the Show. 
The Cultural Evening provided to be a success again this year and was a chance to display our school's talents on areas of art, clothing and fabrics, music and theatre arts.



Overall Newman came first with 1151 points, St Brigid's and Mazenod came second with 1145 points and John XXIII came third with 1108 points.




