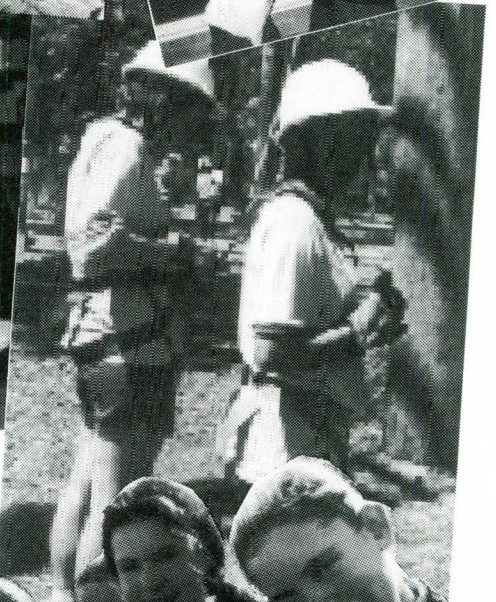
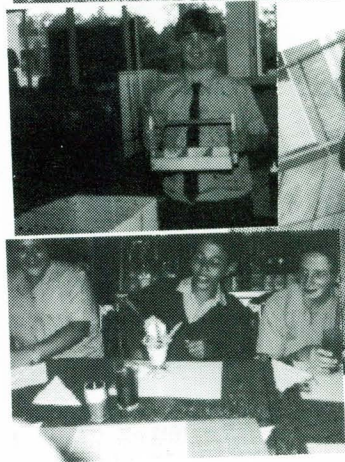

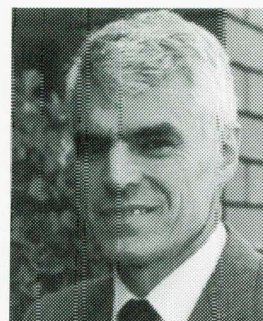

Special thanks must go to Mrs Nockolds and Mrs Foster for all their help and guidance throughout the year.

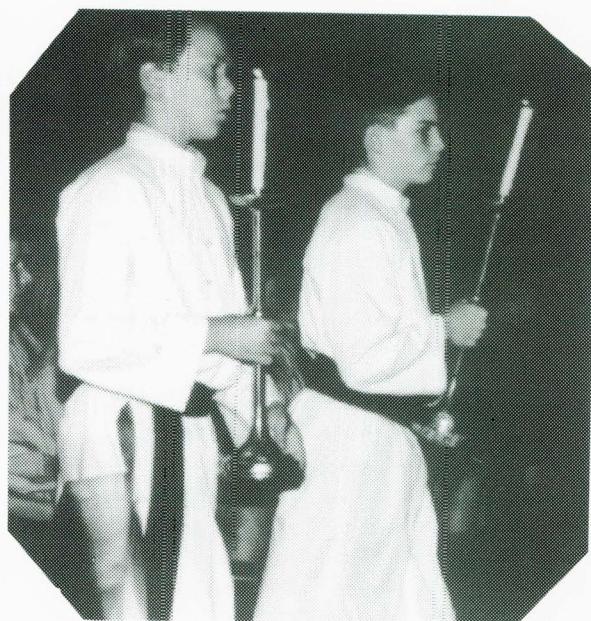
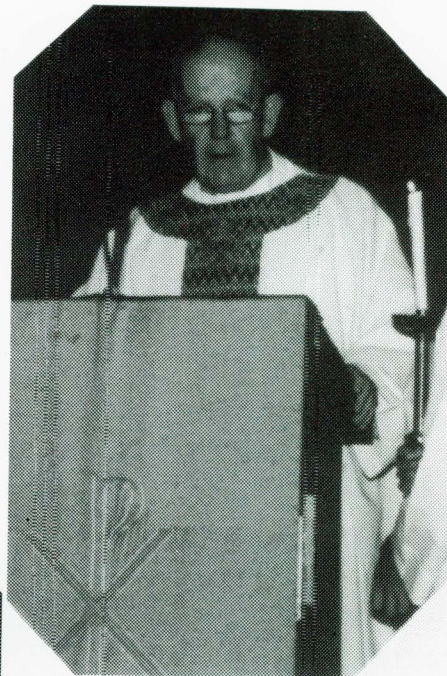

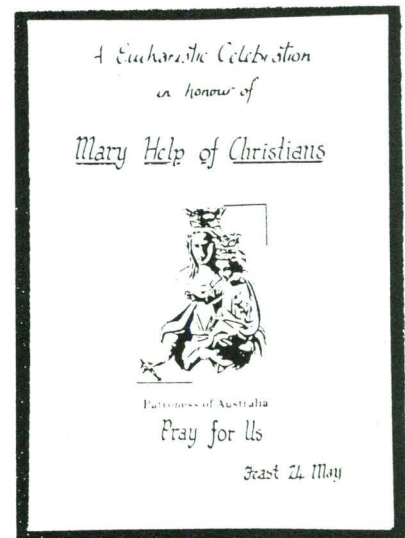
At the conclusion of the Mass, badges were presented to the new student leaders of the College. A light supper in the Siena hall was provided by the Newman Auxiliary.

Year 8 Camp - Rooms 1&2

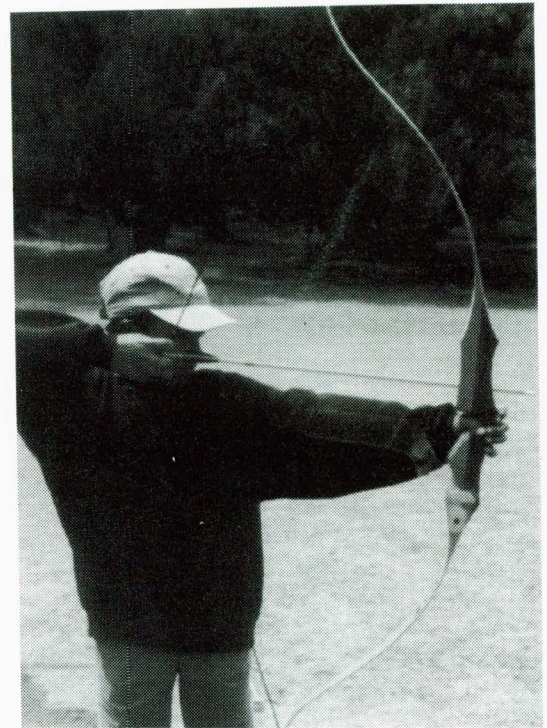

Italian at Newman Siena

Aural work is made more varied with audio cassettes; indeed, some oral tests are taped by the students, a method which allows more personal feedback on individual performance from the teacher.

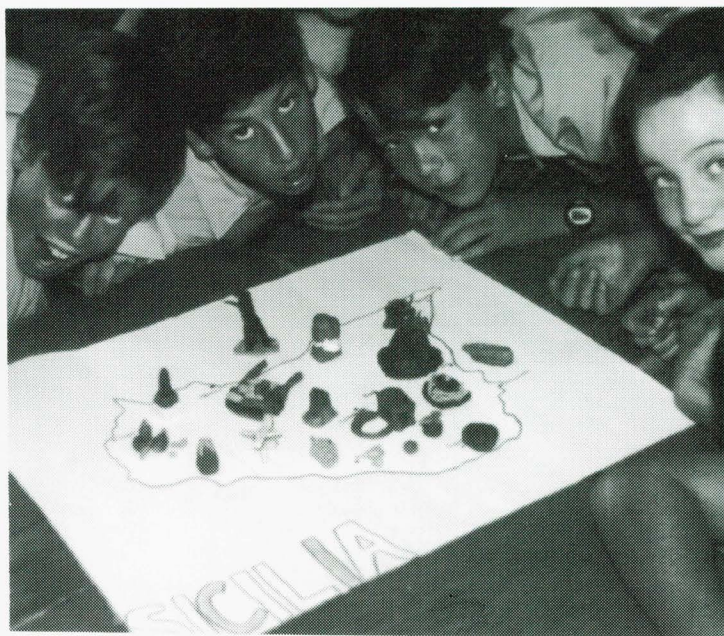
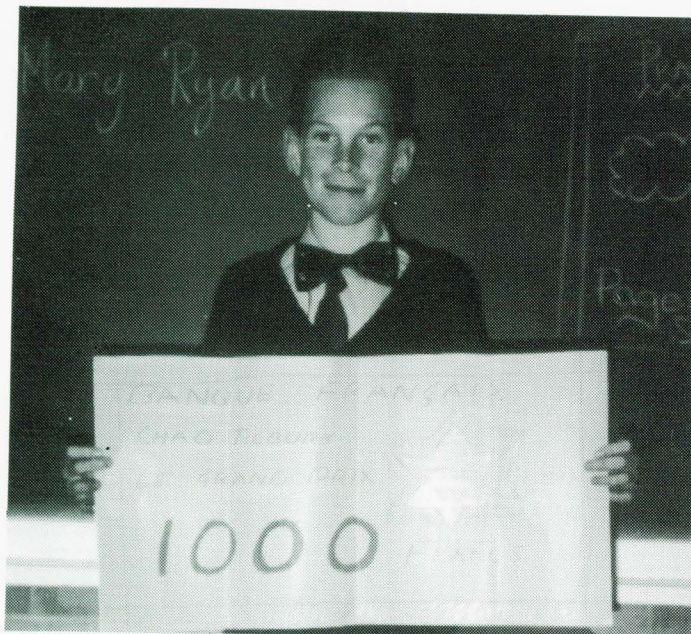
Though too young to take part in the Dante Alighieri exams or the Exchange Student programmes, a group of our Years 9s joined the senior school group and in the care of Miss Drago, went to Italy in January and by all accounts the trip was a tremendous success. Generally our students go on excursions around Perth, visiting restaurants and occasionally the cinema.

The more academic side of the programme is based on the S.E.A Guidelines at this level, the emphasis is placed on communicative skills relevant to the age group's areas of interest. The course concentrates on the giving and receiving of information, on communicating and socialising with their peers and on creating, at times, some original work depicting some aspect of cultural interest.

This year a group of Year 8 students created a map of Sicily with all the important monuments made in Plasticine and the Year 9s reproduced the Tuckshop menu in Italian. Mrs South put one example on show for the benefit of students and their mothers!

This term the Year 9 students will be working on tourist brochures in Italian which will illustrate places of interest in Western Australia.

The students at Siena, after studying Italian for two years not only have an excellent pronunciation but most also take with them a deeper understanding of the Italian people and of what makes Italy a great and fascinating country.

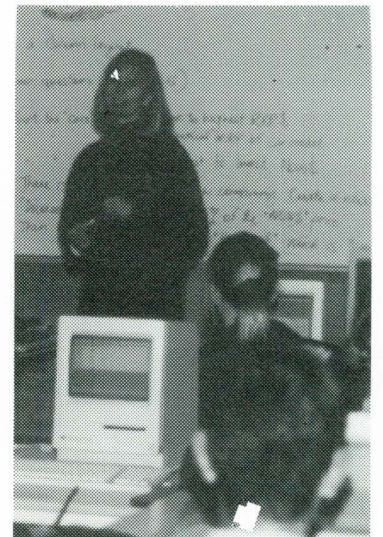
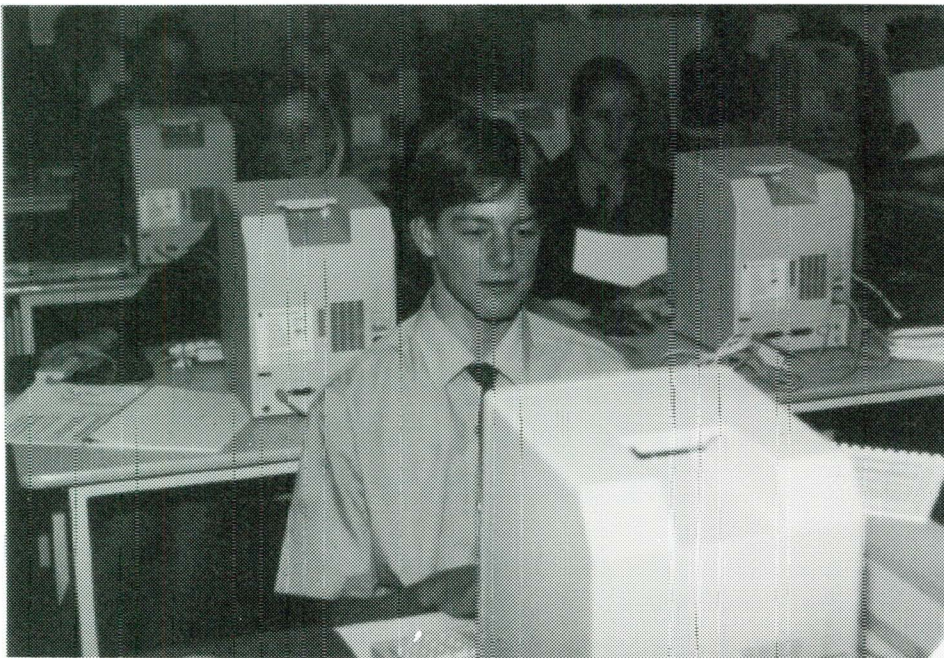
Typing

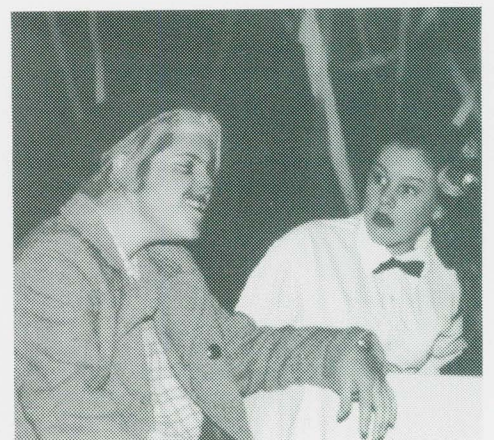
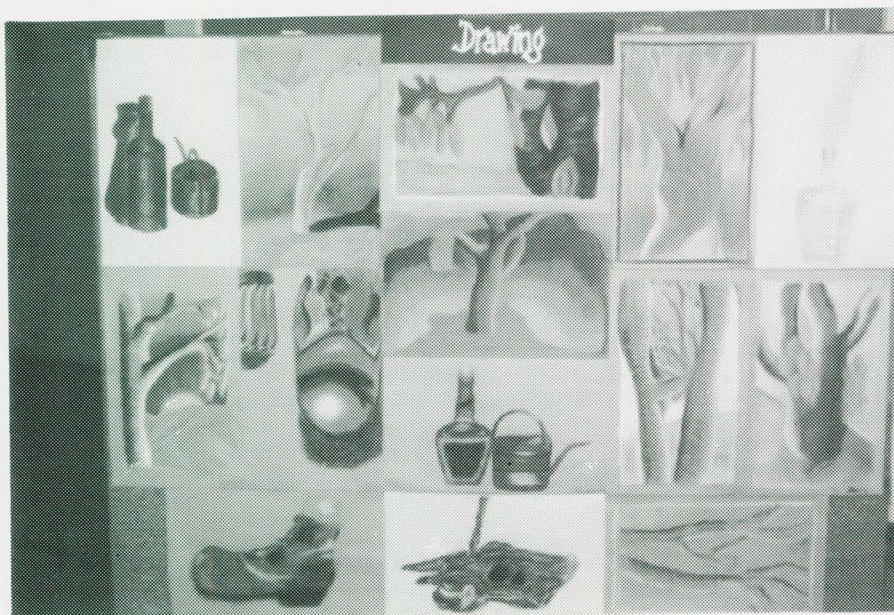
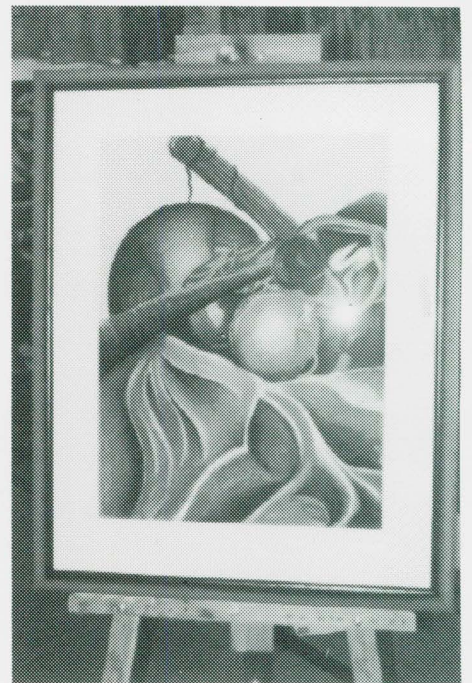
"A Family Affair" was the theme for this year's Cultural Nights held on the 22nd and 23rd September.

While the year 8's were on camp, the year 9's were involved in a variety of activities both in and out of school.

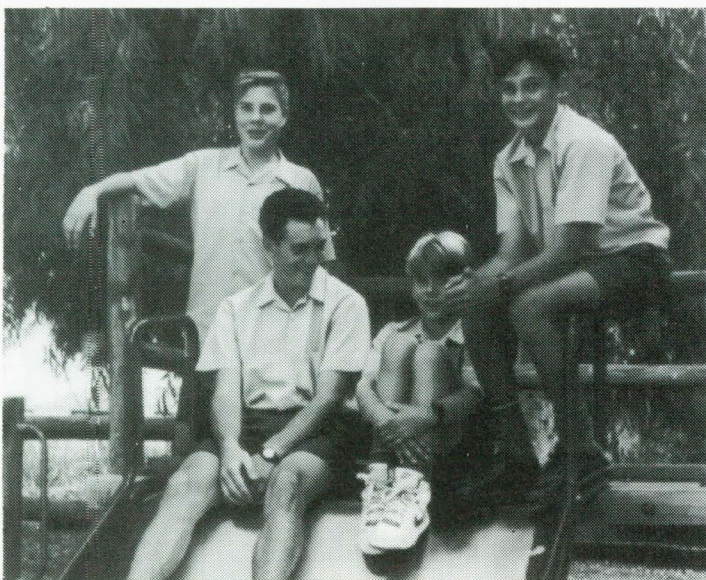

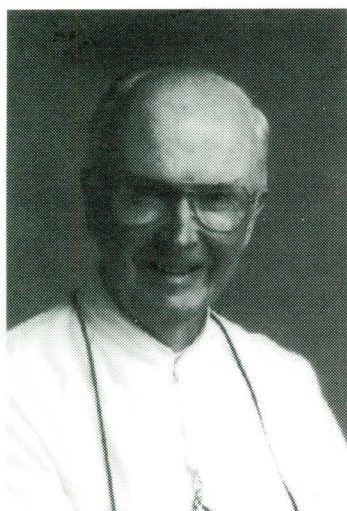
